Brethren and Companions,

As I announced at the last Annual Investiture ceremony in 27 May last year, it was my intention to fully integrate the Craft and Royal Arch into one singular Provincial organisation. The purpose of this strategic change was to ensure that our members, and our prospective candidates, clearly understood from their initial interview, that a full participation in a Masonic journey included both of these wonderful Orders.

Our West Kent crystal ball must have been working well, as the subsequent strategic roadmap from United Grand Lodge - "2022 and beyond" - which was launched earlier this year clearly lays out the need for that integrated approach, and which will enable us to increase even further the number of members in the Craft who are exalted into the Royal Arch.

This is therefore the first edition of West Kent News that I am addressing you in my capacity as Grand Superintendent and since May last year, a substantial amount of work has been undertaken to assist us in this regard.

We are all familiar with the phrase – "Pure and Ancient Masonry consists of three degrees and no more, namely those of the Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft and Master Mason, including the Supreme Order of the Holy Royal Arch".

The Pro First Grand Principal has recently reinforced this by saying "... when someone is made a Mason, he needs to be fully aware at the outset that his journey as a Freemason

consist of these four elements – with the Royal Arch as the fourth and ultimate stage and one which enriches and completes that journey".

The reality is that we are one fraternity - so when someone is made a Mason, he is embarking on a journey that is incomplete until that final element is taken.

Please therefore urge all of your Masonic friends who have yet to take this step that it is never too late to do so and they will be assured a very warm West Kent welcome when the time is right for them.

The Companions who I'm looking forward to investing during the Royal Arch element of our Annual Investiture in June have alreadv shown commitment to this ideal, by encouraging and supporting those considering taking this important fourth element.

In order to assist the aim of increasing our Royal Arch membership, you will all be aware that we have set up a similar Membership Experience team to that which we have in the Craft, under Vince Lethbridge, and I am very optimistic that the team's focus on attracting, retaining and retrieving members will generate huge dividends for us all.

We have reinvigorated the role of the Royal Arch Representative into that of the Royal Arch Liaison Officer, and those members who the Royal Arch Executive and I wish to see appointed for this important new role have been recommended to our Lodges for immediate appointment.

We have also created the new role of Chapter Membership Officer – a similar tole to that undertaken at a Lodge Membership Officer – and who will work closely together with their counterparts in the Craft to ensure a seamless transition of Master Masons who wish to complete their masonic journey.

Additionally, in order to ensure that prospective applicants understand this four stage Masonic journey at the outset, we have revised the questions to be asked at an interview stage and which will become the West Kent template – these are to be circulated to every Lodge Secretary very shortly.

We have much to look forward to in the coming year – not least our Provincial Annual Investiture on Friday 9 June, which will as usual be open to members, families, friends and most importantly, those that may have an interest in joining us.

Our Provincial spectacular will consist of the Royal Arch investiture in the morning and, following lunch, the Craft investiture thereafter. Every Craft member – whether in the Royal Arch or otherwise – is encouraged to attend the morning and afternoon sessions, and it is my avowed wish that we fill the Grand Temple to capacity again, just like we did in 2019. Please, do come and join us and support the Province. Membership Development remains our singular over-riding Provincial priority, and our close working relationship with our Lodges and Chapters is helping to achieve excellent results in this important area. I'm absolutely delighted to see so many summonses report new initiates and Exaltees, more joining and re-joining members, which evidences that our membership attraction measures are working. However, to ensure that we meet our objectives, we most focus ever more closely on decreasing the number of resignations we are seeing year-on-year, I am very confident that we will see a return to positive membership growth for our Province in the immediate future.

Our achievements toward the West Kent 2026 Festival total continue to impress and many of our Lodges and Chapters have already many major progress in achieving either the Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum award and in some cases, the Special PGM-G.Supt Award.I am most grateful to each of you who have committed to regular modest contributions via Gift Aid for your continued support, even during these difficult times, and encourage every member who has yet to qualify for a Festival Jewel to do so at the earliest opportunity to support our aims to assist the outstanding work of our Masonic Charitable Foundation.

In closing, as always, my very best wishes to each and every one of you – and your loved ones – for continued success during the rest of the Masonic season and I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at Great Queen Street on 9 June.

Keep well, look after each other and continue to enjoy your Masonry in our magnificent Province.

Regarding our Royal Arch Membership Development Team, I want to thank them for all the hard work they have put in; they are now well-established and have started to embed the processes and duties required of them by our Grand Superintendent.

I also want to thank Companion Nando Caicedo for the excellent work he has undertaken in conjunction with our RA Membership Officer in creating a new West Kent RA advertising leaflet that will be given to all new Master Masons in West Kent; being a member of our Province for only four years, this again proves that one does not need to be a longstanding member of this Province to be able to contribute at the highest level.

It was pleasing to hear the importance of the RA again being underlined by one of our High Rulers when Jonathan Spence, after he was Installed as the Pro 1st Grand Principal in November said, '...when somebody is made a Freemason, he needs to be made fully aware from the outset that his (masonic) journey consists of four elements, with the Royal Arch as the fourth and ultimate stage, and one that enriches and completes that journey...it is an aspect that I hope all will aspire to experience...' The Province of West Kent fully embraces this, indeed our Grand Superintendent's vision is of a Province that has the highest percentage of RA masons.

I am pleased to say that the future of Royal Arch masonry in West Kent is looking bright; we continue to attract good numbers to the Order, and with the fantastic work of our membership team, we are endeavouring to stem our losses. ## THE ASSISTANT TO THE PROVINCIAL GRAND PRINCIPALS: CHRISTOPHER ASHBY

How did I get here?

When I joined Freemasonry, like everyone, I was overwhelmed with new friends who made it welcoming and soon made more. After attending a number of meetings and beginning to understand how the lodge worked, I realised that it was the members who took an active part that enabled it to be stable and grow. For me looking at the work the Director of Ceremonies (DC) undertook I realised that this was the office for me. Just one problem! As a young mason how would I get what I saw as my dream office?

The DC in my lodge was the father of the sons who brought me into freemasonry, but as you can imagine there was the old school of past masters with whom to contend. In reality, they were strong in their beliefs in the quality of work and offered advice and support. Once I passed through the WM chair I asked to be Assistant DC (ADC) several times. As is always the case one is asked "What experience have you". Of course, I had none but eventually was given a chance.

To attain any office within a lodge or chapter is a proud, if not worrying, moment. I was proud but also nervous as I was out of my comfort zone. I believed that everyone should step out of their comfort zone as this is the only way to progress. After several years as ADC, I achieved DC in the lodge. I was personally committed that we would continue to deliver the best ritual lodge in our Province. (Before I get bombarded with emails – Yes, I know all lodges are the best in our Province!)

I must have made a mark with the visiting Provincial Officers as my first Provincial appointment in the Craft was Assistant Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies, thereafter Provincial Senior Grand Deacon, Provincial Senior Grand Warden and then a Grand Officer.

In the Royal Arch I was also the DC of my Chapter and as with the Craft progressed with a first appointment of Provincial Grand Steward. Of course I joined the Stewards Chapter and set off to be the DC, (what did you expect!). Stewards are considered by some to be a low Provincial promotion yet they could not be more wrong. Every Steward is an active Provincial Officer for life and usually receives a further promotion within 3 years instead of 6 or 7 years.

The next promotion received was to Provincial Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies (ProvAGDC), Provincial Deputy Grand Director of Ceremonies (ProvDGDC), and then Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies (ProvGDC). In my view I had achieved the best office in the world. I have always seen the DC's office as one where you work with people encouraging them to be the best they can. This can only be achieved as a team and not an individual. I have had the privilege to work with wonderful Freemasons.

The phrase 'it is better to win the hearts and minds of Brethren and Companions than rule over their lives and fortune', is something by which I try to work.

THE ROYAL ARCH-SOME POPULAR MYTHS

It never ceases to amaze me that even today there are many myths and misunderstandings about this wonderful Order, so rightly described as the root, heart and marrow of Freemasonry.

So here is a list of them, not exhaustive by any means and if you hear these repeated anywhere, you can correct the speaker!

#### MYTH NO 1

You have to have gone through the Chair of your lodge to join the Royal Arch

Wrong! The only qualification today is that you have been a Master Mason for four weeks and upwards.

#### MYTH NO 2

It's best to wait until you have been through the Chair of your lodge

Wrong! You can join as soon as you are qualified and there is no compunction to take any office until you feel comfortable in doing so. Just join, sit back and enjoy!

#### MYTH NO 3 It's really an Order for elderly men

Wrong! There are many younger Masons in Royal Arch who have discovered what a fascinating, colourful and rewarding experience it is.

#### MYTH NO 4

You don't need to join Royal Arch to have a full Masonic career

Wrong! Royal Arch is the natural fourth element and the completion of your journey in Pure. Antient Freemasonry. Indeed, without it you will not be eligible to be awarded Active Rank in the Craft in our Province. Think about that. Further, many of the Companion Orders beyond the Craft require it as an qualification essential for membership.

#### MYTH NO 5 It's ritually very complicated and hard to understand

Wrong! The ritual and symbolism is very beautiful and quite different to Craft in many ways, leading in particular to a profound sense of one's relationship with the Supreme Being. As a path to further knowledge, it is unrivalled.

#### MYTH NO 6 It's too serious.

Wrong! Royal Arch meetings are well known for the lack of overformality and the intimacy participation brings to their Companions-literally those who eat bread together and have a lot of fun in the process!

#### MYTH NO 7

It will take up so much more of your time.

Wrong! Most Royal Arch chapters meet just three times a year. In West Kent we have over 60 of them and there is bound to be one that is just right for you, ready and welcoming.

#### THE DEPUTY PROVINCIAL GRAND MASTER: IAN GALLEHAWK

As ever, my article has been submitted at the last moment but this time for a very good reason as I wanted to be able to report on our first quarter activity as accurately as possible. As I hope you will be aware, the strategy produced by UGLE is looking to a 1% increase in membership over the first 3 years of implementation. Needless to say, this requires that we arrest the decline in our member numbers and significantly increase the numbers we attract into the Craft.

As I type, we show signs of managing the decline in members with our numbers being slightly up on 2022-year end. This puts us in step with the UGLE strategy that envisages action to arrest the decline, "flatline" and then enter an ongoing and permanent period of growth. This improvement in our fortunes has not happened by accident. As I travel around our Province, I never cease to be impressed at the effort and determination of so many of our members to ensure that our Lodges flourish and that our Province grows into the future.

This has been a difficult quarter for everyone and yet we see member numbers improving and attendances at meetings increasing. At the same time, the pandemic did not bring about the increase in members leaving as many had anticipated. By the time this article is published, we will be into the second quarter of 2023 and will be seeing the many initiations proposed in this first quarter taking place. Last year, we initiated a total of 145 new members into our wonderful Province. Our "membership challenge", i.e. losses minus gains expressed as a percentage of gains, stands at 76%. Put differently, our initiations need to increase by just over 100 per year on current figures. 250 initiations per year is a significant ask of our members and Lodges. If we do not take into account Past Masters' and other such Lodges, this works out at around 2 initiates per Lodge per year with a continuing emphasis on retention.

As the summer break now looms ever closer, I would ask that we all redouble our efforts, get the Members' Pathway firmly embedded in our Lodges and all pledge ourselves to be part of a Lodge that sees us build on our current upturn and ensure that West Kent leads the revival in fortunes of UGLE.

Lastly, a "personal thank" you for the tremendous support and encouragement that I have received in my first year as your Deputy Provincial Grand Master. I have been met across our Province with warmth, friendship and a real feeling of working together. I look forward to the rest of 2023 with considerable hope and optimism.

#### ASSISTANT PROVINCIAL GRAND MASTER: DAVID HUNTLEY

What would you do if Freemasonry were to disappear?

I hate to ask this, but if you consider the decline in our national numbers over the years, this could be a possibility in the foreseeable future, if we do not arrest this trend.

When I was initiated into Sidcup Lodge in 1996, we had around 9,000 members in West Kent, yet we now stand at around 3,800 and despite the number of initiatives and hard work that the PGM, his Executive and our Membership officers have put in to prevent this decline, Freemasonry is still on a downward path.

It is so surprising to me that several Lodges have yet to embrace the Members' Pathway and given the successes being achieved by those that have, it is like burying your head in the sand and hoping for the best instead of actively creating change.

The Members' Pathway is a proven method to increase members in your Lodges – there's nothing to lose by doing so and all it takes is a little time, thought and effort and your Lodge could be reinvigorated.

Despite the national trend, we now have more initiates joining West Kent than for the last few years and our resignation rates are lower every year, but we still lose more members than we gain – and I ask myself why?

Members can sometimes become despondent when they feel left out, members fall out with each other over the most trivial things and of

Course the Grand Lodge above calls a number of our members to higher service which we of course cannot control.

So, how can we address this? Well, please consider the Members Pathway. If your Lodge hasn't embraced the Members' Pathway, why not?Ask your members to support you in this regard and, if someone blocks this proposal, discuss it at the next committee meeting and see how others feel bout reinvigorating your Lodge. Social events are in my view absolutely essential to retaining members – perhaps a simple quiz night, curry night or other events of this kind can bring the members and families together so that wives and partners can get to know each other and become more involved in what we do.Members therefore feel involved and engaged.

After each meeting, look at those who have attended, those who have given apologies, and then contact each of those who haven't been heard from to make sure that they know they were missed and are not forgotten. It is so easy to miss a few regular meetings and then fall out of the habit of attending your Lodge whereas a simple telephone call from the Almoner, Proposer or Seconder could have prevented this happening and re-engage a member.

Encourage your members to take offices and keep them engaged, ensure that those Officers who hold an office for many years longer than the recommended five-year term, do not discourage others from having the opportunity to occupy the role. It may be that no one else wants the job or there are not enough members to take the office and that is a different situation but the busier Lodges with sufficient members should think of those who might get despondent if they have no role within your Lodge?

A last thought - we all know non-masons, perhaps friends, colleagues or relatives who would be perfect for Freemasonry. Perhaps you might want to ask them along to your social evenings or a Ladies night, or simply ask them if they would like to join us. There is nothing to be lost by asking them and everything to lose if we miss out on another dedicated contributor to our Province and with 4,000 of us to do so, just think of the number of new members we could have if only half of those we asked were to say yes.

Let's get on the front foot and make your Lodge and our Province one that we can be proud of, and I wish you every success in with member attraction and retention.


Celebration of Craft and Royal Arch Provincial Investitures Friday 9 June 2023

THE SECOND 25 YEARS OF WEST KENT The Researching and Writing of the Provincial History

50th Anniversary of the founding of the Masonic Province of West Kent following the division of the former Province of Kent into two parts, East and West. A singular event not least because the division of a Province into two parts has not been repeated since.

The history of the first 25 years of the Province was written at the time that anniversary was celebrated so arrangements needed to be made as to the recording of the second 25 years as the 50th Anniversary approached.

Accordingly, in October 2020 the Provincial Grand Master entrusted responsibility for this important task to the West Kent Scriveners' Lodge, the lodge for Secretaries, Scribes E and Treasurers in the Province, who were delighted to accept the challenge that was offered. A working group to undertake the work was established and this has been meeting at three weekly intervals ever since. The working group itself comprises of some eight members of whom all barring one are members of the Lodge.

The first task was to work out how the history could be put together. What are the source materials? And where could they be found? For instance, we heard there was a lot of documentation stored in the basement of Oakley House. A sure place to visit. But, we then discovered that whatever had been stored there had been cleared out many years ago. So that was no good. We therefore set about identifying what had been produced at the material time as the years rolled by and what was still available. The answer was twofold. West Kent News and the Annual Provincial Festival Programme.

We were able to track down copies of these documents for each year, which provided base information. At the same time we recognised that we needed to interview those whom we thought would have an interesting story to tell. In the end, we identified some forty brethren, most of whom welcomed the opportunity to be interviewed.

We also had to form a view as to how long the history should be, what photographs should be included and how should it be published? The answer to those questions is around 60 pages with photographs and published electronically so that all brethren will be able to enjoy access, with some hard copies also being available.

Having decided the preliminaries the exercise proper could get under way.

The extracting of information from each edition of West Kent News would be a lengthy job and was entrusted to one of our number. As this was undertaken, a data collation file was put together which progressively outlined key events as they were successively revealed. At the same time, the interviews got under way. A form of questionnaire was prepared to ensure that appropriate questions were consistently asked of those interviewed. The interviews themselves were in most instances undertaken via Zoom although a few were conducted face to face. Generally, there was an interview team of three and the results were recorded with the information obtained being incorporated into the data collation file to provide a source book from which the history could be written.

From commencing our labours in November 2020 it was not until the spring of 2022 that the data collation file was sufficiently complete to allow the writing of the history itself to commence. But first, the mapping of the work to provide an indication of what is to be covered.

And so piece by piece the history has revealed itself. Of course, the data collation file was not always sufficient making further research necessary. And then as the written work emerged an editing team took over to undertake the taxing, but essential tasks of checking grammar, consistency of expression, spelling and all those other things we thought we had left behind many years ago at school! But, it had to be done.

As the history has been written, so the events have come into life once more. Provincial Grand Masters and their Executive have burst onto the stage, made their mark and departed. Initiatives have been pursued and the life of the Province has blossomed into view. Festivals have been held and targets pursued with functions to celebrate. Individual Lodges have celebrated anniversaries as have long serving brethren and colourful characters have made their mark and yes, the irrepressible Gordon William Sinclair Davie is much in evidence. We also have had sad occasions when popular brethren having made their contribution have been called by the Great Architect to higher service. Sometimes, all too soon. We have tried to capture something of them all, to bring your history to life and to celebrate the times through which we have all lived.

The stage that we are now at is that the initial writing is nearly complete. So photographs are being collected and collated and the editing group will now be progressively engaged in producing the finished product.



## Next time you watch a soccer or rugby match remember this.., by the time that you put on the kettle for a half time cuppa or fight through the crowds for a pie and a pint, another man in the UK will have died as a result of Prostate Cancer.

I first used that analogy about 20 years ago when I wrote a surgery leaflet on behalf of the embryonic organisation that has now become the country's leading charity dedicated to Prostate Cancer research and support.

Much has changed, diagnosis has improved, treatment and survivability have exceeded all expectations but negative factors remain, prime among them is IGNORANCE. It's easy to ignore, firstly, it does not show many symptoms and it is too easy to blame those nocturnal visits to the bathroom on the extra pint or cold weather when it could be a subtle early warning. Next comes the infallibility syndrome, 'it'll never happen to me', don't kid yourself, it can. Prostate Cancer is probably the most insidious disease that a man can face.

Another thing that has changed is the perception of the disease; even only 20 years ago it was regarded as something not to be discussed in polite company; a nasty affliction that old men got below the belt. That was an ill-conceived view. Do you regard yourself old at 40? 45? 50? because even at a relatively young age it is still a real danger.

There is no solution, no vaccination, if you get it you get it, a fact of life. However, the single most important factor in a positive outcome is simple early diagnosis. It is successfully treatable by any one of several procedures. All of them are

daunting and should be discussed with your wife and family before deciding but...and mark my words... do nothing and you have a very real chance of becoming no more than a statistic.

What's your first step? If you have the slightest doubt see your GP without delay, the outcome might be a referral but on the contrary it might put your mind at rest.

No symptoms but over 40? Get out your diary (how quaint) or log on to your phones calendar and reserve the 24th June as potentially the most important day in your year.

If you do happen to get a positive result it isn't the end of the world, your GP will rapidly refer you for further tests, the outcome of which will determine the way forward. Indeed there are even factors that can lead to a false positive from the initial test. Remember that the PCT is available to offer you support if treatment is needed and you would like a chat with a Brother who has experienced what you are facing.

In closing I can do no better than to quote from an email sent by a Brother who had an unexpected positive result at one of our sessions.

"I remain grateful of the opportunity for the test, else I'd still be blissfully ignorant and getting worse daily, without a clue."

## HELPING HANDS: CHRIS GLADWELL of TOTTENHAM SECUNDUS LODGE

Helping Hands is a collaboration between Tim Bates and WBro Chris Gladwell. Tim is an operative mason who is currently completing a Diploma in Sculpture at the renowned City & Guilds of London Art School. Chris manages masonry, construction and restoration projects in London.

The piece symbolises the act of one brother lifting up another in times of need. The hand doing the lifting is the smaller of the two, showing that even the strongest of us need help from time to time. The stone has been left heavily tooled to give life and texture, and to show the hand of the carver at work.

A limited edition of these are being cast in Bathstone coloured material, a warm honey coloured stone. There will be no more than 50 of this type created. They are life size and are suitable for display indoors or out.

They are available at £300 each plus postage and packing. £30 from each piece sold to a West Kent Lodge or mason will be donated to the West Kent 2026 Festival Fund. Tim and Chris hope this sculpture will be enjoyed by masons for many years to come.
