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# A MESSAGE FROM THE GRAND SUPERINTENDENT AND PROVINCIAL GRANDMASTER: MARK DOUGLAS ESTAUGH

Brethren and Companions,

It is once again time for our regular edition of West Kent News, and I write with a sense of optimism that the Masonic season up to June 2023 has been one where we have been able to reinvigorate our Masonic activities in earnest and that most if not all of you have returned to your Lodge or Chapter meetings.

I cannot begin to tell you how delighted I was to see your support for our combined Provincial Craft and Royal Arch meetings on Friday 9 June and am given to understand that over 1,300 people booked in to attend the day's events and over 500 at the luncheon, which is normally restricted to that maximum number.

This is a testament to the magnificent commitment and support on your part with which you have blessed me throughout my term of office and, perhaps, to the benefit of combining our Chapter and Craft Investiture meetings on the same day in such magnificent surroundings at Great Queen Street.

However, I need to reaffirm that this Provincial Investiture meeting is YOUR Provincial spectacular – not just that for the recipients and their supporters – and I therefore hope that many more of you who were not present this year will support this special event next year.

Given the aligned Provincial approach to our Craft and Royal Arch membership development strategy, our Deputies in the Craft and the Royal Arch held a very successful Visiting Officer briefing session at Oakley House on 20 June – almost all our Craft and Royal Arch were in attendance, with the remainder being briefed at a Zoom session later this month.

Each of our VOs now has a clear understanding of our Provincial Membership Challenge for both Orders and how, working in tandem with our Lodges and Chapters, we will be able to share each unit's membership paradigm, and bring further successful growth to each of our units.

We should remember that the warrants entrusted to our Lodges and Chapters empower them to "make masons", which should be their over-riding priority, and I'm encouraged at the number of new members joining our ranks. However, I am still saddened that some Lodges with candidates in the pipeline are not embracing the opportunity to conduct multiple ceremonies, deeming this to detract from the initiate's experience.

I can confirm that I was initiated. passed, and raised in a double ceremony and despite not having met mv fellow candidate before admission into the Craft, the experience we shared made us life-long friends, and I had the great privilege of installing him as Master of our Lodge some years later. Please, do not keep candidates waiting in the wings ensure that they are received into our fraternity promptly and help me in our quest to enhance our member numbers accordingly.

Despite the stressful economic climate that faces us, we continue to see encouraging trends from those being initiated and exalted, which is augmented by the number of joining and re-joining members. However, to ensure that we meet our objectives, we

must focus ever more closely on decreasing the number of resignations we are seeing year-on-year, which is one of my key priorities for the rest of my term of office, and I am very confident that we will see a return to positive membership growth for our Province in the immediate future.

At our Provincial Investiture event, Roland Stokes shared with us the extensive and very impressive list of Lodges and Chapters that have already achieved either the Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum award and in some cases, the Special PGM - G. Supt Award.I am most grateful to each of you who have committed to regular modest contributions via Gift Aid for your continued support, even during these difficult times, and encourage every member who has yet to qualify for a Festival Jewel to do so at the earliest opportunity to support our aims to assist the outstanding work of our Masonic Charitable Foundation.

In closing, I would like to appeal to those members whose approach to Freemasonry is one which is based on memories of the past, and "how things were done back then", rather than to "looking forward to what Freemasonry in West Kent can become" – if we are prepared to embrace change and innovation, rather than reflect on past glories.

Enjoy your summer break, go well, look after each other and continue to enjoy your Masonry in our magnificent Province.

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# THE DEPUTY GRAND SUPERINTENDENT: JAMES MARSH

Companions,

I do hope that you are enjoying the summer recess and that you will be refreshed and ready when the new season begins in September. The Provincial team are preparing for the new season, and planning is already underway for Provincial Grand Lodge and Chapter in June 2024...

However, by far the most important issue on my desk at the moment is the Royal Arch Membership Challenge. As you will all be aware, the Pro 1st Grand Principal, Jonathan Spence has stated that all Provinces are to make membership a priority - we are to halt the downward trend in members numbers and within three years, he wants the Craft membership to increase by 1% per year, he has also stated that he wants a significantly improved membership within the Royal Arch.Further, the Grand Superintendent has charged me with implementing his strategic plan of increasing the current 42% of our Craft members being Royal Arch Companions to 50%.

It is obvious that to increase our RA membership, we have to Exalt more candidates; however, to sustain good growth, it is vital that we also stem the number of Companions leaving our Order.

I have no doubt that with a little more application, both the Grand Superintendent's and the Pro 1st Grand Principal's challenges can be achieved. For example, to have realised the first part of the RA Membership Challenge in West Ken

for last season (i.e. to stop the downward trend in our RA numbers), we needed only to have Exalted 10 more Companions, or had 10 fewer resignations or cessations! Last season's RA membership challenge is shown below.

With each Lodge having now appointed a Royal Arch Ligison Officer (RALO) who will encourage their Lodge members to join the Royal Arch, and each Chapter having a Chapter Membership Officer (CMO) their will encourage all Companions to source Exaltees, I am confident we can achieve, and indeed West Kent exceed the RAMembership Challenge.

As you will know, we already have in place a committed Royal Arch Membership Development Team headed up by Vince Lethbridge; he and his team stand ready to assist CMOs and RALOs to forge links –


furthermore, the Grand Superintendent has authorised that the names of our RALOs and CMOs to be placed on the private side of our website. With these new measures now in place, there is no excuse for our Chapters not to be able to source new members, to assist in fulfilling the RA Membership Challenge and, most importantly, for many more of our members to enjoy the fourth, and most impressive element of the masonic journey.

My challenge to the Royal Arch in West Kent for this upcoming season is twofold:

- 1. for every Chapter in the Province to Exalt at least one Brother: and,
- 2.to reduce our resignation / cessation / exclusion percentage rates to the lowest they have ever been.

Companions - I am confident you will be able to fulfil these challenges!

As the summer is here and we are enjoying long summer evening and our summer holiday destinations, the Royal Arch team in conjunction with the Membership Team is busy behind the scene preparing for the new Masonic season in September 2023.

The Team is fully focused and devoted to the Membership Challenge outlined by the Pro Grand first Principal and the Most Excellent Grand Superintendent. Ιt is our intention communicate this to all our Brethren, so that with your support we can achieve the short term aims and put in place processes that will help us achieve our long term goals. This will involve working with lodges via their Royal Arch Liaison Officers (RALO) as well as with Chapters via their Chapter Membership Officers (CMO). These are key offices and we will be actively working and supporting them in their roles.


The RA Membership Team will be contacting Brethren who are eligible to join the RA as well as unattached Companions to consider membership of the RA and complete the 4th and final element of their masonic journey. Contrary to other opinions, Master Masons of four weeks and upwards are eligible to join the RA. The best time to join is as soon as you are eligible so that you can take time to understand the RA while you are progressing through the offices in the Craft Lodge without taking up an office in the Chapter.

I am responsible for Lodges and their RALOs and with the assistance of the Craft Visiting Officers looking to increase the percentage of members belonging to the RA and the 3rd Provincial Grand Principal and Chapter Visiting Officers will be working with the Chapters and their CMOs to maintain their membership.

I was delighted to meet so many of you at the Annual Provincial meeting on 9th June at Great Queen Street and once again congratulations to all who received promotions and first appointments. So good to see so many friends and family present at the Annual Event as well as the visitors from neighbouring provinces.

By the time you receive this newsletter, my 72hole golf challenge will be over. I wish to thank everyone for sending messages of support and have generously supported me in the fund raising.

# 3rd PROVINCIAL GRAND PRINCIPAL: **TONY BURD**

It is just over a year since I was invested as your Third Provincial Grand Principal, where has that year gone?

Representing our Province at other Provincial Grand Chapter meetings, interacting with my peers, building relationships, has been incredibly rewarding, and I have been fortunate to attend a number in the year.

It was always be going to be a full on and intense masonic year, and without doubt with the greatest number of changes in the Royal Arch in West Kent, in the fifty years since the Province came into existence!

Freemasonry three hundred years ago, is beyond recognition to as it is now, so "we have always done it this way" is a single generation perception! We have to change and adapt to external influences, necessary for us to thrive.

Following the appointment of Visiting Officers last year, the Royal Arch Executive and the Membership Development Team (RAMDT) has been in overdrive. In summary the key element changes this year have been the following:

- The appointment by Chapters of a Chapter Membership Officer (CMO).
- We are now in the process of a similar exercise for the placement of a Royal Arch Liasson Officer (RALO) in every Lodge. The RALO will receive Royal Arch Membership Eligibility Record, RAMER, detailing all in his Lodge, eligible to become members of the RA, for him to use as a tool in his key role.
- Next stage will be to link up the CMOs with Lodge Membership Officers (LMOs), and RALOs, to complete the circuit, to promote RA membership attraction. Under the direction of the Craft APGMs, the Royal Arch will be actively promoted in Lodges.

A Freemason who is a member of the Royal Arch as well as the Craft, is three times less likely to leave Freemasonry than if he is only in the Craft, that's a win for the Craft!

Other innovations, include the recent issue "Managing Resignations in the RA WK flowchart" for Scribes E, to fully explore why a member may be contemplating resigning.

Chapters might want to give some consideration on how to make their meetings more appealing. When without any work, or developing items of interest, rather than "open your meeting, carry out admin items, and closing the meeting", some may question what is of interest to attend this limited format?

New Master Masons receive a letter from the PGM, congratulating him on taking his third of the four elements in Pure Ancient Freemasonry, delivering a personal invitation to take his fourth step.

The questions a candidate for Initiation is asked at his interview has undergone a complete review, and now includes a section on the fourth element, the RA.

A year of many, but essential, developments and changes!

### HEAD OF ROYAL ARCH MEMBERSHIP **DEVELOPMENT: VINCE LETHBRIDGE**

Since the announcement at last year's joint Provincial investitures of the Provincial Grand Master / Most Excellent Grand Superintendent's (PGM / MEGS) intention to have the Craft and the Royal Arch more aligned and to be seen as one joint entity rather than what is perceived by many as two independent units there has been a huge amount of work undertaken behind the scenes to realise the PGM/MEGS vision, among these works are new initiatives which have been introduced to not only attract new members but also to enhance the Royal Arch experience of our existing Companions.

To achieve this objective the role of the Royal Arch Almoner is a much more enhanced position now and is more in line with the duties carried out by our Craft Almoners, our Chapters now have a dedicated Royal Arch Mentor in place as well as the creation of a new office of Chapter Membership Officer (CMO) our Chapters also have in place their own dedicated Chapter Visiting Officer whose duties will emulate those of our Craft VOs.

To further underpin and support our Chapters with these new and enhanced positions the PGM/MEGS also announced the formation of the Royal Arch Membership Development Team (RAMDT) of which I am delighted to have been tasked with heading.

As you are all no doubt already aware, as part of our ongoing membership strategy the role of Craft Royal Arch Rep or Chapter representative has been changed to that of a much more membership focused role and this office is now officially called a Royal Arch Liaison Officer (RALO) we would like to thank those Lodges who have already informed us of their RALO but for those Lodges yet to do so, please let us know who your intended RALO will be.

Over the coming weeks and months every RALO in the Province will be personally contacted by a member of the Royal Arch Executive, following this conversation the RALO will then be supplied with a 'Royal Arch Membership Eligibility Review' (RAMER) of his Lodge, this is a personalised review of every member in the RALO's Lodge and it will highlight every member who is not only eligible for Exaltation but also those Companions who are currently unattached. A member of my team (RAMDT) will then contact the RALO six months on from them receiving their RAMERs for an ongoing courtesy membership follow up.

# THE DEPUTY PROVINCIAL GRAND MASTER: IAN GALLEHAWK

As we now approach what, for many, is the summer break, it is a good time to reflect upon our performance as a Province over the first half of 2023.

As you will doubtless be aware, membership is now the focus of virtually all our activity. So far this year, our Province has significantly turned its fortunes around and this has only come about because of the tremendous collective effort made by everyone to grow our numbers.

As I'm sure you are aware, the UGLE strategy focuses on 1% per annum growth by year 3 (we are approaching year 2) and 2% by year 7. While, at first glance, these seem like small numbers, they must be seen in the context of decades (literally) of declining member numbers.

At the mid-point of 2023, there is a genuine and realistic opportunity for West Kent to end the year with more members than at the start. For the first time in a long while, we have arrived at the midway point having flatlined our numbers. Total losses through resignations remain exactly the same as last year. Total losses for all reasons show a slight reduction. This is all very positive and shows that we are moving in the right direction. Over the summer, let's make sure that we look after our members, get ahead of events and do all that we can to eliminate resignations. It is a reduction in resignations that is critical to ensuring that we see growth in West Kent and across the Order in general.

Initiations have shown a significant reduction on this period last year. One reason for this is that Lodges are managing the backlog caused by the pandemic as we pass and raise our newer members. As I type, we have some 212 members waiting to be passed with a further 58 waiting to be raised. While this is an excellent challenge to face, we must also remain focused on the ongoing need to ensure that we grow our numbers. It is the only way that we will secure the future of our Province. Please be innovative in how you move forward. Work with other Lodges at your centres to see if any assistance can be provided as regards passings and raisings. Consider double ceremonies or emergency meetings but please retain the focus on growth. You have done so well to get us to our current position, let's keep the momentum going and build on it. Every Lodge needs to attract 2 new members per year and reduce resignations. I know you are as passionate about our Province as I am and really look forward to the positive results of all the current activity.

As many now start a well-earned break, we are likely to spend more of our time in the company of those, who have yet to join our wonderful Order. Let us take this opportunity to have those conversations with, and make those approaches to, the right people and only ever the right people. Never compromise on our values or the integrity of our Province and Order. The right people are out there. Quality will always triumph over quantity. I look forward to sharing in the spoils of your activity towards the end of the year I send my best wishes to and with you.

Now look at how you, and I mean every one of you, can take steps to prevent these losses in the future.

From the newest Initiate to the Provincial Grand Master and above, we are all equally responsible for keeping the Fraternity going. We can only do that if we all pull together and look at how we can attract new members, retrieve past members and most definitely retain existing members by careful mentoring, almoner interaction and by joining in our meetings and visiting other Lodges too.

The Lodges that meet at Welling and Wrotham, Group 2, are all extremely dear to me and many, over that past few months have enjoyed outstanding meetings. From double initiations, passings, raisings, milestone anniversaries and personal anniversaries in the form of 50th 40th and 30th Citations and Grand Lodge Certificates.

Many of you have also received preferment in Provincial Grand Lodge and Chapter. Congratulations to you all. With that preferment however comes great responsibility. Take the message of the Membership Challenge back to your Lodges. Increasing our new members in the Craft by 76% and 20% in the Royal Arch, are required in our Province to stabilise the decline in Membership. I cannot stress how important it is for us to do all we can to halt the decline and to grow our membership.

For those of you in 'Light Blue' please seek out the Light Blues Club on our Provincial Website, there are many activities planned and you will be amongst friends and likeminded

individuals where fun, friendship and camaraderie are the watchwords.

For those of you in 'Dark Blue' please encourage your newer brethren to engage with the Light Blues Club, there is no age limit and it is free to join.

Lodges in Group 2 that have not yet appointed a Lodge Royal Arch Liaison Officer (RALO) please do so sooner rather than later. All Lodges would have been sent names of those suggested by the Provincial Grand Master. You do not have to wait until installation.

On a lighter side I have just turned 60. For those who will be celebrating 50 years in Freemasonry this year I salute you.

I hope you all have a fantastic summer with your friends and families and enjoy your time. I look forward to seeing you all when we return to Masonic labour.



# Excellent attendance for PSA Screening

On a sunny, hot morning when it must have been very tempting to spend time enjoying the weather, 348 Brethren, family and friends made the trip to Oakley House for the Care Team's annual Prostate Cancer tests. Of those 119 were first timers, which demonstrates an increased awareness of the importance of being tested. When the results were in, 9 attendees required urgent follow-up tests with a further 6 recommended to see their GP without undue delay.


However, it wasn't just PSA testing on offer and 179 attendees took advantage of Blood Glucose screening, five of whom were recommended to visit their GP. For the first time a variety of other optional screening was on offer with 119 participating in a broad range of tests.

Our Deputy Provincial Grand Master, Ian Gallehawk was among the first to arrive, whilst the Teams own Grand Originals, Phil May, Colin Wright and Jenny the phlebotomist were back, having been the instigators of the first session in 2016. Colin was once again ensuring the smooth running of the physical aspects of the day having also procured all the necessary equipment. George Buckberry, another member of the original team, did the fantastic and unenviable job of coordinating the bookings and ensuring that all the paperwork was in good order, ably assisted by Stefano Buscaglia.

Once again, the Widows Sons transported the samples to the Pathology Lab, this time led by Terry Nemeth, who was accompanied by six other biker Brethren.

Thanks are due to everyone involved, the phlebotomists, volunteers, the Brother Paramedics... far too numerable to be named here but without whom 15 attendees may have remained blissfully unaware of the need for further investigation.





### FRATERNAL LOVE AND **FELLOWSHIP**

Back in 1975 a group of Brethren and Companions in East Lancashire requested their Masonic Centre to make a room available occasionally in order that they might form a Masonic Fellowship, essentially a club where not only widows but older, perhaps lonely, Brethren and their wives could meet socially on a regular basis. Needless to say, it proved very popular and a number of similar groups sprang up around the country including one in our own Province which meets in the Dartford Masonic Centre. The Fellowships aim to further that sense of belonging to the "Masonic family" thus enabling older members and widows to maintain contact with the Craft in a social environment

The Dartford Masonic Fellowship meets twice a month, typically starting with mid-morning coffee which is followed by a talk on some topic of general interest given either by a visiting speaker or a member of the Fellowship. The meeting ends with an optional two course lunch.

The Fellowship also arranges day trips and holds a Christmas Lunch. Upwards of 60 widows, Brethren and their wives attend each meeting. Currently the Fellowship has to charge a subscription of £25 per year which just about covers the basic running costs. The lunch costs a further £16.

Ideally there should be similar Fellowships throughout the Province, not necessarily at each Centre but certainly covering every area. However, there are a number of issues that have to be faced if this is to be achieved. Firstly, the availability of a low cost venue that can provide affordable dining.

Secondly, finding a sufficient number of dedicated volunteers prepared to take on the tasks of setting up and running individual Fellowships. Thirdly and by no means least, money.

These issues are not insurmountable, we are sure that there would be sufficient support from Brethren and Companions, the venues are available at our Centres and the financial arrangements at Dartford do work; although ideally there should be a way of subsidising at least part of the cost. In an ideal world groups of Lodges would come together to assist and support a Fellowship in their local catchment.

As the group charged with complementing the work of our Almoners, specifically in improving the well-being of our members and widows, the Pastoral Care Team is anxious to encourage the development of new Fellowships. We cannot provide funds, we can do little to provide physical support but we can share the experience of others and assist in setting up new ventures. Further, in conjunction with our Province, we are able to provide support by communicating with potential users. # ORDERS BEYOND THE CRAFT: ORDER OF THE SECRET MONITOR

The Order of the Secret Monitor revolves around the Brotherhood of David and Jonathan and is, in its way, older than Freemasonry itself having developed from a Dutch secret society in the 1500s.

The story of David and Jonathan is one of great friendship. David was the father of King Solomon, who we all know from our Craft masonry. Originally a shepherd, he became an aide at the court of Saul, Israel's first king. David distinguished himself as a warrior, and his encounter with Goliath is known to all of us. Jonathan was the eldest son of King Saul and forged a strong friendship with David. After Saul jealously turned against David, Jonathan attempted to reconcile them, but he was only briefly successful. Saul tried to enlist Jonathan's aid to kill David, but Jonathan remained David's friend and warned him of Saul's anger so that David hid. The shooting of arrows is part of this story as well as the various refuges occupied by David where Jonathan visited him. Jonathan knew of these hiding places by secret means of recognition, hence the Order of the Secret Monitor.

The principles of the order are founded upon these grand examples of friendship and also the social duties of benevolence and charity.

As Craft masons we meet in Lodges, but an assembly of Secret Monitors is held in a Conclave. There are three, outwardly simple but profoundly moving degrees and it is upon the principles exemplified therein that the system of communicating friendship and caring among the members of the Order is promoted in a practical way.

The First Degree recounts the great and abiding friendship of David and Jonathan, and the lesson this degree imparts is the intrinsic importance of true friendship. The Second Degree emphasises the further lesson of fidelity to the brethren. The Third Degree of the Order is unique in English Freemasonry in that it is also the ceremony of installation, in which the elected brother is installed as Supreme Ruler of his Conclave.

As part of the ceremony the newly installed Supreme Ruler also receives his 'commission' (usually from the Provincial Grand Supreme Ruler), which carries the rank of 'Supreme Ruler within the Order'. The third degree prepares a brother for the responsibilities of leadership and reinforces the new relationship he has with his brethren as a Supreme Ruler within the Order.

Unique to the Order of the Secret Monitor are the four Visiting Deacons who have a special function within our Conclaves, not dissimilar to that of Lodge Almoner. The primary responsibility of a Visiting Deacon is to maintain regular contact, between meetings of his Conclave, with the members who have been assigned to him, and afford assistance and support to a brother in time of sorrow and distress. Reflecting the important nature of their caring role they are seated at the corners of what is designated the Holy Ground or Magen David in a Conclave.

The Order is non-denominational and open to every member of a Regular Craft Constitution. Within Kent we have ten Conclaves situated throughout the county. Our rituals and ceremonies generate a deeper understanding of the Craft principle of brotherly love. In the Order of the Secret Monitor the Supreme Being is called 'The Almighty Friend of all friends', the significance of which can only be fully appreciated by members of the Order.
