



I look forward to reconnecting with you all at the Investiture.







ROYAL ARCH-THE UNMISSABLE EXPERIENCE

Our Royal Arch membership in West Kent is at an all-time high. From 2022 to 2024 our numbers grew steadily and this year they surged.

This pattern has been replicated in other Provinces and Royal Arch is undergoing a significant upswell across UGLE. Why?

To those of you who are Master Masons and have not yet joined Royal Arch, here explanation of why so many of your peers have chosen to experience this fourth and climactic event in their journey in Pure, Antient Masonry. It is also an invitation to you-to talk to your lodge RA Liaison Officer and learn more.

RA is the fourth and final step of your personal journey in Pure, Antient Masonry. There are certain things in the Third Degree that are left open and Royal Arch provides the answers in a brilliant, colourful and deeply meaningful ceremony called Exaltation-and it is not called that for nothing!

- That ceremony is like nothing else in Freemasonry and very different to Craft; it is however indissolubly linked to particular, it evokes a greater understanding of the nature of the Being Supreme and your relationship to it
- Today, candidates for Initiation pay a single fee which entitles them to join both Craft and Royal Arch; why would you buy a ticket to a wonderful fouract play and then walk away before the last act which is the climax of the whole performance?
- Exaltees will be very happy to tell you that their Freemasonry has been immeasurably enriched by joining Royal Arch-many join chapters that are not linked to their lodges and thus discover a whole new circle of friends-Companions by name and Companions by nature
- Being in Royal Arch confers a raft of distinct and significant advantages, which include eligibility for consideration for Active Rank in Craft and the ability to join other Progressive Orders in Freemasonry require it before admission

- The ambience in a Royal chapter is noticeably Arch different to that in a Craft Lodge; you will find it less formal and even more intimate, as befits an elite band of men
- Finally, you will have the assurance and status of being a Free and Accepted Mason in the very fullest sense of that term-a wonderful base from which to expand your Masonic horizons even further.

Right now we are at a very exciting juncture in West Kent for both Craft and Royal Arch. During the months to come you will learn more of a new, fully integrated membership vehicle called Building Together.

This will be underpinned by a Provincial membership team acting in a unified way, dedicated to growth and retention of our members across both Orders. This will be nothing less than the final realisation of the phrase "One Journey-One Organisation".

Every new Initiate and Companion should be supported by both a Unit Mentor and a dedicated Personal Mentor to guide them through the early stages of their Masonic journey.

At the heart of our mission lies a simple truth: Freemasonry should be enjoyable and fun.

Enjoyment is the cornerstone of engagement and retention, it must remain our central focus.

Building Strong Relationships

By now, each Craft Lodge Mentor should have begun building a relationship with their assigned Provincial Mentor, engaging in discussions about mentoring and engagement strategies at lodge level.

These early conversations are the vital first steps in: Fostering supportive relationships, Identifying opportunities for improvement, Sharing practical ideas that truly enhance the Masonic journey for new and experienced members alike.

A Collaborative Approach

When Lodge and Provincial Mentors work together, we create a collaborative environment where we

can share ideas and best practices, listen to different perspectives and find practical and flexible solutions. This is not a one-size-fits-all approach.

at the end of the Initiation ceremony)

A well-prepared welcome pack offers clarity and reassurance on an overwhelming day. It should include Lodge and LOI meeting dates and times, contact details for key officers, lodge bank details, hymns, dress code, etiquette and any other helpful lodge specific information.

Best Practice Document - "Pick & Mix" Approach

The purpose of this document is to provide lodge mentors with a practical framework of proven strategies and flexible approaches to support effective mentoring at all levels of freemasonry. It is designed to enhance the experience of every member by promoting meaningful engagement, personal development, and long-term retention.

Solomon: Learning at Your Own Pace

An invaluable online resource for personal development. Use Solomon to encourage self-directed learning, deliver engaging "nuggets" at LOI, promote EA, FC, and MM Certificates presented in Lodge or LOI to celebrate achievement.

West Kent Light Blues Club is an excellent initiative for brethren yet to receive provincial honours. It offers informal networking, opportunities to meet peers, a stronger sense of belonging.

Promoting the Royal Arch within the Lodge encourages deeper engagement, broadens members' understanding of Freemasonry, and strengthens connections by completing the journey in Pure Antient Freemasonry and expanding their masonic circle.

Encouraging Active Participation

Encouraging active participation for every Brother and Companion is vital, fostering involvement through structured visiting programmes and unit led social events. This will help build lasting bonds and a true of belonging. Informal gatherings outside lodge such as dinners. family events. community activities play a crucial role in forging friendships, involving loved ones, strengthening sense of community.

Social Engagement is a vital pillar, we must never underestimate the power of social connection.

Encouraging Lodge visiting, in particular, can significantly enhance the masonic journey. It builds camaraderie, fosters personal growth, and let's not forget it adds an important element of fun and enjoyment.

In Summary

Our shared goal is simple:

To create meaningful, enjoyable, and supportive masonic experiences that inspire commitment, friendship, and pride in membership.

By Building Together unit by unit, brother by brother, we can make this a reality for every member.

I hope you managed to take advantage of the summer break to work on your plans to attract new members so that your unit can close this year with a larger subscribing membership than last year.

Being refreshed from that summer break and returning to our Masonic business we now need to schedule the initiation of any sponsored candidates and progress relations with Independent Enquirers to qualify them as suitable applicants for membership, or not as the case may be, and then build ceremonial work plans around them.

There are positive signs that Lodge activities, guided by our Provincial Membership and Mentoring Teams, are beginning to influence results. Resignations reported so far this year are down compared to last year and are on a par with the number of recorded initiations but the closure of a number of Lodges and the cessation and exclusion of members continues to widen our Membership Challenge. Retention remains the key to success.

That said, there are already quite a number of Initiations scheduled for the coming months and some former members of closed Lodges have yet to conclude the process of applying to join an alternative West Kent Lodge. I would ask that those members endeavour to conclude their joining before the end of this year and if any member requires assistance with selection of a suitable Lodge, please let me know. I have been greatly encouraged to hear and see positive changes towards our "Yes If. not No Because" culture and across the

Province I have seen Lodges and Chapters:

- · Schedule two different ceremonies in a single meeting to accelerate the progression of existing members and create the capacity for membership growth
- · Arrange extra, extraordinary meetings to reduce the waiting time of sponsored candidates for initiation who are eager to join us.
- · Adapt their traditional unit practices to accommodate multiple candidate ceremonies, be they Initiations, Passings, Raisings or Exaltations
- · Streamline some of their meeting agenda, such as minute and report reading, to make time for more ceremonial activity and/or shorten the meeting time
- Offer new membership opportunities to other units where their planned future work leaves little scope for initiations or progression within a reasonable timescale

All these efforts to embrace change and adapt practices will contribute towards our goal of meeting the Provincial Membership Challenge.

No unit can afford to merely pay lip service to our Membership Challenge and the need to plan its' own future. If your Lodge has not yet engaged with your Provincial Membership Officer (PMO), or has yet to turn discussions into actions, then please be receptive to doing so.

Our PMOs are on hand to give their time to help you plan the future shape of your units to attract new members so do reach out to them. Don't forget it's Your Lodge, Your Future.

As we move into the last quarter of 2025, we need every Lodge to be in positive growth mode and I can only encourage the prioritisation of initiations, conversion of joining member opportunities and the progression of suitable prospective applicants including Independent Enquirers.

Finally, there are some exciting times ahead for membership activities as the Building Together Strategy comes to our Province. In short, this is the harmonisation of the best membership practices and processes currently laid down for our use in the Members' Pathway and Archway. Its' purpose is to strengthen and future-proof our Lodges and Chapters and move us even closer to One Journey, One Organisation.

Building Together implementation will take the form of Provincial Executive briefings alongside Provincial Membership Team training ahead of a rollout to the wider Province in the coming months. More information will follow in due course.

As we open another Masonic season, we often think about what lies ahead ___ the ceremonies, the festive boards, the opportunities for learning, and pleasure of the renewing friendships. Yet I would like to take this opportunity not simply to look forward, but also to reflect on a lesson I have learned over the past few months.

Earlier this year, life became unexpectedly challenging for me. At first, I did not realise the toll it was taking. My energy was lower, my focus was not as sharp, and I was not as present as I would like have been both Freemasonry and in my personal life. It was only when family, friends, and brethren gently pointed it out that I began to take notice. Their kindness. their willingness to reach out, and their understanding made all the difference. Because of them, I was able to face up to what was happening and begin to put things right.

I share this not to seek sympathy, but because it reminded me of something important about Freemasonry, and about the West Kent Light Blues Club in particular. Our purpose is not just to introduce newer Masons to the workings of the Craft, or to

encourage them to explore and progress in their journey. It is also to provide a circle of support, fellowship, and connection — a reminder that we are part of something bigger than ourselves.

Every one of us, no matter how experienced or how confident we may appear, will go through times in life when things do not feel quite right. Sometimes it is obvious; more often, it is subtle and unseen. A brother may simply be quieter than usual, or seem distracted, or perhaps miss a meeting or two. It is in those moments that the smallest act of kindness can have the greatest impact. A quick message, a friendly phone call, or a quiet word of encouragement can remind someone that they are not alone.

This is why empathy matters so much. Sympathy, though wellintentioned, can sometimes create distance. Empathy closes distance — it says, "I understand," or at least, "I care enough to try." In my own experience, it was empathy, not pity, that helped me to recognise what I was going through and to find the resolve to move forward. That is a gift we can all offer one another, and it costs nothing more than our attention and our time.

The Light Blues Club exists to retain and engage our newer brethren. One of the most effective ways we can achieve this is by creating an environment where people feel welcome, valued, and supported. Ritual and learning are important, of course, but fellowship and genuine connection are what truly bind us together. When we show each other kindness, when we take the time to listen, and when we offer understanding, we are living out the very essence of what it means to be a Freemason.

Looking back on my forty years in a professional life dominated by male workplaces, I have seen what happens when support is absent, and men feel unable to speak openly. By contrast, I have also seen the transformation that occurs when people are encouraged to check in on each other, and when it becomes accepted that it is "alright not to be alright." In Freemasonry, already have the structure, the brotherhood. and the shared values to make this culture of openness and care thrive. We need only choose to put it into practice.

So, as we look forward to the season ahead, let us do so with a renewed commitment not just to the formalities of our meetings, but to the spirit of our fraternity. Let us look out for one another, extend the hand of friendship readily, and remember that kindness is never wasted.

In truth, our greatest resource in the Province of West Kent is not our buildings, our ceremonies, or our history — it is each other. The bonds of friendship and brotherhood are what make our Craft special, and they are what will keep it alive and flourishing for generations to come.

Brethren, be kind. Be supportive. Be empathetic. Look for the quiet signals, listen for the unspoken words, and do not be afraid to reach out. You never know the difference it might make — and one day, it may be the very thing that makes the difference for you.

A MODEL OF REVIVAL

In an era when traditional clubs and societies struggle to compete with the comforts of home, streaming services, and the evergrowing pull of social media, one West Kent lodge is not just bucking the trend—it's setting new benchmarks in Masonic recruitment, retention, and revitalisation.

Just a few years ago, Hayes Kent Lodge No. 5929 was facing the real possibility of closure. With only 13 Brethren and dwindling interest from new members, the future looked bleak. Fast forward to today, and the Lodge is not only thriving—it's breaking records and leading by example across the Province of West Kent.

This remarkable turnaround is thanks in no small part to the tireless efforts of Naz Cesur, the Lodge's Membership Officer and Secretary, supported by an equally committed team. Under his leadership, Hayes Kent Lodge has grown to become one of the largest and fastest-growing Lodges in the Province.

Record-Breaking Growth and Recognition

The Lodge made history as the first in West Kent to initiate five new members in a single meeting—a feat achieved with the full support and guidance of the Provincial ceremonial team. That same spirit of momentum continued with the welcome of four more joining members at the very next meeting, along with five additional applications being read out.

Their Chapter work is equally impressive. After taking over a failing Chapter, Hayes Kent welcomed 10 exaltees in one meeting—a record in its own right.

The Lodge has also been honoured with a Platinum Award for its support of the 2026 Festival, reflecting its commitment to Masonic charity and Provincial goals.

Empowering New Brethren and Supporting Others

Hayes Kent Lodge doesn't just focus on growing its own numbers—it's equally committed to nurturing its members and uplifting others. Younger Brethren are encouraged to take active roles in ceremonies, often leading parts traditionally reserved for more experienced Masons.

In a standout moment, an initiation ceremony for Martin Bieszke was conducted entirely by junior Brethren—including Entered Apprentices and Fellowcrafts who had been initiated only months earlier. The event was made even more special by the presence of three Assistant Provincial Grand Masters, an APGM designate, and other senior Provincial officers.

The Lodge also supports wider Masonic collaboration, recently partnering with West Kent Cornerstone Lodge to deliver a joint Second Degree ceremony and double Third Degree ceremony at Ash Cum Ridley Lodge. offering valuable experience and fraternal support.

Outstanding Leadership Recognised

Naz Cesur's impact extends beyond Hayes Kent Lodge. For his work with Ancient of Days Chapter No. 9230, he received the Most Excellent Grand Superintendent's Platinum Award for outstanding contribution to Royal Arch Masonry, along with the Provincial Grand Master's Special Award.

PGM W Bro Mark Estaugh praised his efforts, stating:

"When one considers that the Lodge has admitted 45 members in the past decade, it proves that dynamic and focused leadership is a must in our Lodges. There is no greater exponent in West Kent than the outstanding Naz Cesur, who is an absolute credit to the Lodge."

He went on to highlight Hayes Kent's adoption of the Members' Pathway as a model for success:

PROMOTING MASONIC MUSIC

Dear Brethren, Companions and members of other masonic orders, who meet in the province of West Kent.

'Music to your Ears'.

I write with good news, and to let you know about some exciting initiatives, which will hopefully result in more music within your meetings, help attract more musicians into the Craft and to develop existing musical talent.

But before going into detail, I thought you might like to know the PGM's view on this matter:

I'm delighted, that once again, brethren from West Kent are leading the way and taking the initiative, to enrich the experience of candidates during their Initiation and indeed, all of our members.

But perhaps, even more important, the measures which are being taken, will help develop musical talents and provide an enhanced opportunity for additional perspective members.

Mark Estaugh PGM West Kent -May 2025 Most masonic meetings commence with the Opening Ode, and when accompanied by an organist, it can be quite uplifting. Furthermore, music brings gravitas and levity, at the right moments, through the ceremony. There are in excess of 1,500 masonic meetings within our Province every year, but presently we only have eight active organists, plus a small number of guest musicians.

I understand, appreciate and acknowledge, that playing the organ, especially in a live setting, can be quite bewildering, as the controls look akin to something, you might expect to find, on the flight deck of Concord, and it's quite different to a piano.

Nevertheless, of the 3700 or so members, in West Kent, I suspect that several brethren, may be hiding their musical talents under a bushel. Some brethren may have had music lessons in the past, but neither had time or purpose to develop their skills. Perhaps with encouragement, brethren would like to reignite their passion, or achieve previous musical aspirations.

Lodge Organ – Pre-Recorded Tunes

Over the last few months, with just a few exceptions, West Kent's Organs have been fitted, with a new a replacement upgraded drive, which will enable a 'flash drive pen' to be inserted. The 'flash drive pens' are now available, and come with pre-recorded tunes, such as the opening ode, closing ode and national anthem.

Consequently, even if you don't have an organist, the organ will play these tunes for you. We will soon be arranging some basic training.

MASONIC MUSICAL ATTAINMENT AWARD

To provide encouragement, we are launching a new scheme, whereby any brother who achieves the following, will receive one of these specially commissioned attainment awards:

Bronze Attainment Award



A brother who has played:

- The opening ode, the closing ode, national anthem and masonic grace, with melody and supporting base clef.
- Played the above, at his mother lodge, or elsewhere, on at least 5 separate occasions.

Silver Attainment Award



In addition to the Bronze Award requirements, to have played:

- At five different lodges.
- At least one other version of the opening and closing ode.
- The Entered Apprentice and Master's song.
- · Christmas Carols during the Festive Board.

Gold Attainment Award



In addition to the Silver Award requirement, to have performed at a Provincial Meeting.

I would hope that any brother who is given one of these cherished awards, will hopefully wear the accompanying specially commissioned lapel pin badge with pride.

Lodge Organ - Pre-Recorded Registrations

To assist musicians, we have also pre-recorded, onto the flash drive recommended pens, some 'Yamaha Registrations' (a set of sounds for masonic organ meetings). These 'Registrations' are intended to provide Organists confidence, knowing that the organ will sound, during performance, as intended.

Organists Whatsapp Group

Just over a year ago, we set-up, 'West Kent's Organist Whatsapp Group' intended to provide support, encouragement, share music, exchange ideas and report instrument issues. As an example, have discussed what is considered to be the best musical key, for playing the odes. I'm pleased to report that the group has been popular, and we have had musicians from other provinces wanting to join the group, and meet us.

Additional Members

Some of us might have in mind, a prospective candidate, who may enjoy the traditional aspects of freemasonry. Notwithstanding this, perhaps there could be someone else, who would enjoy exercising their musical talents. If you would like me to talk to a prospective member, or even show them what we do, I would be delighted to do so, and likewise, so would any of the organists within the province.

So hopefully, the above may strike a chord with you, and be of interest. I am not just the Brother, who plays music at Provincial Grand Lodge, I am here to help you. Please do not be afraid to ask for assistance. I hope that we will see more Brethren start to exercise their musical talents and develop their skills.
